



First Article - Creation

Not much has changed in that regard. We remain relational beings. Sin has altered our ability to best be in relationship with one another, but the need for relational connection remains in all of us. We continue to need to remain in relationship with one another as well as with God.

As a part of that relationship, God continues to provide for us all that we need to sustain our body and soul through His creation. God uses both the miraculous and the mundane. The psalmist notes that: "You cause the grass to grow for the livestock and plants for man to cultivate, that he may bring forth food from the earth and wine to gladden the heart of man, oil to make his face shine and bread to strengthen man's heart." (Psalm 104:14-15) James further notes in James 1:17 that "Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of lights, with whom there is no variation or shadow due to change." Thus God has not only created but also sustains His creation.
